## RECOMMENDED WEBSITES for TREATMENT AND RECOVERY RESOURCES

**buprenorphine.samhsa.gov** – Search "DATA Physician Locator" for an interactive map by state. Lists physicians certified to prescribe buprenorphine. Please note that this is not an exhaustive list, as physicians are not required to list themselves here.

**OxfordHouse.org** - Oxford Houses are democratically run, self-supporting and drug free homes.

recoverykentucky.com - residential recovery help for chronic substance abuse and addiction.

**dbhdid.ky.gov** – Search "Provider Directory" for assistance in locating various types of treatment in KY. This includes services such as crisis stabilization, psychiatric hospitals, DUI education providers, and licensed drug and alcohol treatment.

**Samhsa.gov** – (SAMHSA) is the federal agency created to address prevention, treatment, and recovery in behavioral health. This site provides multiple resources, free publications, information on current research and data, and current news. **Search "Treatment" for assistance** in locating public and private opiate addiction treatment programs across the country.

**Naabtt.org** – National Alliance of Advocates for Buprenorphine Treatment provides assistance with locating providers who are authorized to provide treatment with buprenorphine. You may also use this site to locate pharmacies and counseling.
